
Dues need to be paid by March 31st. We encourage everyone to mail them in this time and not wait for a show to pay Jeff or Turk.

2021 Rocky Ridge Christmas magic round up

This was a year of changes and new records. After a COVID year off in 2020, the York County Parks decided to make a go of it in 2021. There were some changes, such as taking the sides off previously closed pavilions and other things where we were unsure of the impact. In the end, none of this deterred the crowds. After a year off, milder temps (on average) and a mostly outdoor environment, the lights and trains attracted a new record total attendance. I need to specifically thank my wife Penny and co-coordinator Turk Russell for making this show viable. Their support and involvement were a huge part of our path to success. Speaking of success, this year the club nearly \$1,000 additional dollars of income than any previous show! Here is this year's run down...

The 2021Rocky Ridge season started with the trailer repack held at Locust Hill Farms where the club has stored the trailer and additional items. This was held on Sunday October 17th from 1:30-4pm. We had nine folks present with Penny taking the lead on sorting and repacking much of the Rocky Ridge display items and Turk taking the lead on loading the trailer for the show.

This year's Rocky Ridge Pre-setup was held Monday November 8th from 9:30 to 12:00pm. The club trailer was transported along with the waterfall and most everything we needed except the large roller coaster. We had six workers attending and we succeeded in getting the platforms set and fastened together, closing in and insulating the barn door, hanging the mural and setting the track loop for Thomas and the main Christmas Tree. We did not, as we started in 2019, set any of the other loops such as the main loop or the indoor/outdoor loop. In retrospect, this was a tactical error on my part and something we'll resume in 2022!

The main setup day fell on Saturday November 13^{th,} and it was cool, but not terribly cold. We offset that with Jason Scott's heater, and it was quite comfortable even with both doors open much of the time. Barry & Linda McNew and Mary Jane Reiff provided refreshments. That was greatly appreciated by all! Although we had a slightly smaller than expected crew of 18 members and various family members, we completed the bulk of the setup between 10am and 3:30pm. Things were looking pretty good when we locked up that afternoon. Not quite ready, but good! A small group of us made a return trip to address the final few items before opening night.

As in 2019 the Park Service, recognizing we are a huge part of the draw, stepped up and made the full payment which was slightly increased by \$200.00 this year. The 2021 calendar afforded us 33 run days between Thanksgiving and New Year's Eve, and we had only two days of closure due to weather leaving us only 31 days to build on the base payment with donations and raffle. A full financial report will be made at the March meeting.

With 31 days open, overall attendance was up from 2019 over 15,000 guests with a total of 51,162 for 2021. Clearly this blows away the 43,000 plus we've seen in year's past, and it seems like the ticketing scheme the park service now uses is here to stay. Given this record, and the more predictable evening endings times, it's hard to complain. We ran sevens trains on the layout, which with the amusement part, is a lot of motion. We also did make a few changes this year to include a longer full passing siding making it extremely easy to switch trains on the main "money" loop versus a simple siding. Penny added a few new characters to include Mario and Waldo. Elvis and his pink Cadillac returned for another year. We continue to contemplate a double track mainline, but we just can't ignore that it would consume too much room and create havoc for the various scenes we place in the layout. Unless the Park lets us increase (even just 16 inches) the size of the platforms, we just can't pull it off. We already have issues with kids "touching" the trains, so we can't really go closer to the fence.

Although it seemed tougher to set the schedule of volunteers in 2021, in the end we had a nice mix of newer members working with our experienced operators and Turk was able to fix small issues, mostly over the phone. Overall, I think we had less problems this year so my thanks to ALL! The custom Lionel Consolidation and the USA-Trains F3 A/B set ran much of the show with our GP38/GP-9 sub'ed in for roughly 8-days. Turk and Barry performed maintenance on the F3 A/B set, the LGB Mogul and the Bachman 0-4-0 as well as servicing all our trains following the show. This maintenance both during and after the show is critical. This stuff is just too expensive to replace all the time and we've really run a lot of miles on these tried-and-true engine lash-ups!

Tear down saw a cold day with snow still on the ground and a large group of 25 helpers on January 15th insuring we got cleaned up and packed up in record time. This was made possible because we did a "pre-tear-down" trip where we removed the fence and most figures and details. Many thanks to Barry and Linda for help on that trip. The "found" coins on clean-up day was a nice bonus of \$72.38.

Raffle Roundup: As I mentioned at the top, this was a year of records with a total of raffle 1,146 tickets sold. I must give a shout out to Turk for once again convincing Bachmann to send this Percy set for free meaning that was all profit.! This year's winner was 8-year-old Wyatt Smith from New Freedom PA. His picture as well as Jeff handing over the prize are included here. Love to see the young kids excited about trains and I can really say there was a lot of that throughout the sessions. I hope all our monitors got to see and enjoy the happy faces! Once again, Deb Scott wins with the most tickets sold (126) on Dec 4th! Keann and Penny came in second selling 113 tickets Dec 18th. Randy Alleman had the record donation night at \$152 and the Russell's and Segessenman's had the overall combined night record of \$235!








2021 Rocky Ridge After Thoughts

I wanted to take a quick minute to ask our membership (and family members) what ideas they have for Rocky Ridge going forward. You are certainly welcome to send them to me via email or call or however you wish to convey them. We'd like to have a discussion on this at the March 9th General meeting. Here are a few of the ideas passed along to me already!

- Put down all track with Platform setup or as a distinct setup trip before the main event. We did this in 2019 and will do it again going forward.
- Permanently create pre-made 5ft and 8ft 90-degree corners. Four of each. We'd need to devise a safe transport structure.
- Build another Thomas loop, with a solid base, that would stay at Rocky Ridge like the Christmas tree loop.
- Cut the remaining tabs off the blocks we use to elevate the Thomas loop and get a few more so it's a solid base all the way around. At least where visible.
- Build a structure under the Christmas Tree Loop to elevate.














2021 Hanover Fire Museum holiday display

Blue Ridge Summit, PA


