## A Message from your President

This has certainly been a challenging year for me since late February. Keeping up with my regular job which has seen tremendous growth the past 2 years. I have advanced osteoarthritis and broke some tendons in my foot earlier. We are all getting old and it's a lot to take care of us! Taking care of Keann with her autoimmune disease and traveling so much, had put me back in the caregiver position which many of you know I have done plenty in years past. Then keeping up with an abundance of train repairs added to my already busy life.

I like people and I enjoy making them happy fixing their items. During covid, model trains became a huge and popular Hobby again. I did not see the demand for repairs back then. I did see a lot of crazy prices and junk trains brought to us for repairs. But this year has been amazing. Barry McNew and I normally work every Tuesday evenings on trains. Keeping up with the demand for repairs, parts, and sound systems and as well as total rebuilds, which has now become a big deal and it takes extra time, parts and \$\$. The last 3 months we have been averaging 15 trains a month. That is way above normal. With a lack of products and a diminished used market, large scale is growing again, but in a different way. The new models are quite expensive and big diesels are the "in thing" for "newbees."

Most Trains are getting older and sourcing parts has even gotten tougher for me. I used to be able to get just about anything and everything I needed to get a locomotive running. If I didn't have it, I have known somebody that did. Those days are fading fast. Cost factors have risen as well. I get a lot of complaints that Bachmann has a nice website for parts but doesn't have a lot of the demanded parts in stock. We also get complaints that USA trains have poor customer service, and you can never get anyone on the phone for help. They still have a lot of repair parts and produce some great locomotives, but it is a slow fix. I say it is a roll of the dice to see if you're going to get your Service Parts in 2 weeks or 3 months.

We are lucky any of these manufacturers are even producing parts because really all they want to do is sell their product. It's not like it used to be where almost all trains were fixable or updatable within reason. Times are tougher and I still try to buy trains or small collections just for the parts and to keep my clients and members still running. But the cost of buying used trains has another factor. G scale Items are getting old! The first LGB train came over here in 1968. Bachmann brought us the 4-6-0 in 1989. Aristocraft trains brought us the first diesels in 1991. Some models are now 25 to 35 years old and are worn. I tell folks these trains are not like old Lionel or American Flyer where they can run 75 years +. A lot of large-scale has become almost obsolete. The economics of repairs now brings the value of these trains way down and sometimes it is not even worth it. I know folks do not like to hear that. Sometimes it is best to just move on and we put it in the junk bin. We enjoyed it and now find another replacement.

If any members would like to sell any of their train items, please let me know as I am willing to help you get them sold.

We all have an oldies or favorite item that sometimes becomes a "shelf queen." So, remember to take care of your trains. Get them serviced and hopefully they will last for future generations.

## Another Aristocraft re-make product

Another Aristocraft re-make product will be coming soon (1:29) EMD GP40 Diesel

The GP40 is one of EMD's most successful 4-axle road switchers. Initially entering service in 1971, production lasted through 1986 when, after construction of almost 3000 units, the final GP40-2 was rolled off the production line. Today, the GP40 series continues to remain crucial to the switching and branch line needs of class one railroads, in addition to short lines and industrial operators. The Bachmann Large Scale GP40 arrives in 1:29 scale with realistic detail, a non-proprietary plug-and-play circuit board for the control system of your choice, and four authentic modern-era paint schemes.














## Larry Nowak Submitted by Turk Russell


Let's make this another great year supporting the club and our main financial source and do it up right for the 40th anniversary!


# **Bunker Hill Open House Train Meet**



Bob Kluk has been approved as our new VP.




## 2024 Layout Tours – Volunteers Needed
