
















Hyatt Open House
















News from your coordinator

I wanted to inform everyone that the club was given the opportunity to take over the Quincy Village Garden RR. Our member Larry Nowak who owns the display and trains, just turned 89 and needs back surgery. He made the offer to me when we passed each other at the hospital. What a coincidence since I have more issues than he does! Larry's outdoor RR is small enough and is independent from the rest of the 6 layouts at the Quincy model RR club. His layout has 2.5 loops and one reversing section. All tracks are on flat level ground. Most trains are battery powered, and some track powered as well. Everything is there we need and trains are stored in a big engine house. The only responsibility is for someone to run at least 2 trains the Sunday after Nov each year. I usually help Larry with this as well as take members to see their awesome displays inside the train building. The plants are already mature, and we would need some ballast and clean up 1 - 2 times a year. 
Bridgewerks power pack back in service.

As most of you know our four-track power pack broke down and I was not able to fix it this time like in the past. I contacted Mark at Bridgewerks who has taking over for his father who passed away 2 years ago. The company only does a part-time business now since huge expensive power packs are not in demand like they used to be, mainly commercial. Mark sent me some schematics, and we worked together on trying to narrow down the problem and get it repaired. He sent me multiple parts, and I kept telling him that one of the power supplies must have an issue because nothing seemed to work. Unfortunately, we both concluded that I'd have to ship the power pack out which sucks because it's so big and heavy.

He called me 2 weeks later and said that I was correct that the power supply had a minor short which we could not prove during all the testing. I'm glad we got it fixed and it's back in business There are new circuit breakers which have been upgraded so they won't blow as quickly. We have two new sliders and the PC boards have both been replaced as well as the one power supply which was repaired. Most of the repairs were done by me and Barry McNew, some were done by Mark.

Hopefully we'll get another 10 years of use, since it gets abused being at Rocky Ridge in a hot and cold environment. Mark told me they now only make these power packs by order. \$1,400 to get a new one holy cow!!

Educate, Engage & Inspire

For dedicated hobbyists in the world of large-scale model railroading, maintenance isn't just a routine, it's an art. At the 2024 Big Train Operator Convention, held in Bird-In-Hand, Pennsylvania, enthusiasts gathered to learn from Turk Russell of the Susquehanna Valley Garden Railway Society. With years of hands-on experience with maintenance and repairs on large scale trains, Turk led an engaging clinic, sharing essential techniques for keeping G Gauge locomotives running smoothly.

Precision Lubrication The Key to Longevity

Kicking off his session, Turk emphasized that proper lubrication is the foundation of locomotive maintenance. He outlined the best practices for keeping gears and moving parts in peak condition, advocating for Plastic-compatible greases to prevent material degradation and Light oils for delicate components like wheel bearings and valve gear, ensuring seamless operation. Turk also explained how to spot signs of wear and determine optimal reapplication intervals, preventing damage before it occurs.

Practical Solutions to Combat Overheating

Few things frustrate train operators more than motor overheating, an issue Turk tackled with practical expertise. He explained how inadequate ventilation can exacerbate heat buildup, leading to performance inefficiencies and potential motor damage. By improving airflow around motors and heat-sensitive components, operators can significantly extend the lifespan of their locomotives.

Production Run Variations

One of the clinic's most captivating segments explored locomotive production run variations. Turk guided attendees through identifying subtle design shifts and mechanical updates, helping collectors and operators appreciate the unique characteristics of different models. His deep understanding of historical context and rare features proved invaluable to those passionate about preserving and operating their prized locomotives.

A Lasting Impact on the Large Scale Community

Turk's presentation wasn't just a clinic, it was a masterclass in locomotive care, delivered with passion, expertise, and historical insight. Attendees left inspired, ready to apply their newfound knowledge to their own collections. As a respected voice in the Susquehanna Valley Garden Railway Society, Turk continues to elevate the hobby, ensuring that generations of enthusiasts keep the big trains rolling.

While Accucraft is not a brand every Garden Railroader can aspire to or afford, they are bringing out (slowly) new steam engines in live steam and electric. Below are two examples. The first one is available now and the second is pre-order. These were Baldwin built consolidations from the turn of the century are basically the same design ordered by the Denver & Rio Grande. In fact, the #3 Elton below was eventually bought be the Rio Grande and became D&RG 425 and later D&RGW 315. Accucraft has a solid motor and gear setup now and these engines run well, but do sport scale flanges, so good track work is essential. These are not for the faint-of-heart though with a final price of \$3,800 for the live steam and slightly less for electric. Even so it's good to see new products. Now if we could just get Bachman to follow suit!


